LINN COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH REMINDS FAMILIES OF COVID-19 THREAT DURING HOLIDAYS

The COVID-19 pandemic has been stressful and isolating for many people. Gatherings during the upcoming holidays are traditionally an opportunity to reconnect with family and friends. This holiday season, consider how your holiday plans can be modified to reduce the spread of COVID-19 to keep your friends, families, and our community healthy and safe.

Celebrating virtually or with members of your own household (who are consistently taking measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19) poses the lowest risk for spread. In-person gatherings that bring together family members or friends from different households, including college students returning home, pose varying levels of risk.

There are several factors that contribute to the risk of getting and spreading COVID-19 at small inperson gatherings.

In combination, these factors will create various amounts of risk:

- Community levels of COVID-19
- Exposure during travel
- · Location of the gathering
- Duration of the gathering
- Number and crowding of people at the gathering
- Behaviors of attendees prior to the gathering
- Behaviors of attendees during the gathering

The following people should not attend in-person holiday gatherings People with or exposed to COVID-19. Do not host or participate in any in-person gatherings if you or anyone in your household:

- Has been diagnosed with COVID-19 and has not met the criteria for when it is safe to be around others
- Has symptoms of COVID-19
- Is waiting for COVID-19 viral test results
- May have been exposed to someone with COVID-19 in the last 14 days
- Is at increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19
- Do not host or attend gatherings with anyone who has COVID-19 or has been exposed to someone with COVID-19 in the last 14 days.

People at increased risk for severe illness.

If you are an older adult or person with certain medical conditions who is at increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19, or live or work with someone at increased risk of severe illness, you should avoid inperson gatherings with people who do not live in your household.

HIAWATHA FIREFIGHTERS WELCOME NEW CLASS OF FIREFIGHTERS



The Fire Department welcomed 11 new volunteer recruits to its ranks in mid-September. The nine men and two women bring a variety of life experiences and backgrounds including business, accounting, military, science, engineering, public safety, fitness, security, and information technology. The 11 new members are: Scott Breckenridge, Mikayla Calloway, Jacob Cooper, Adam Crawford, Robert Johnson, Sudhanwa Kholgade, Ryan Larson, Trent Partridge, Leah Pedersen, Michael Rhodes, and Lukas Voss.

They will be proceeding through a year long orientation and training period that will prepare them for their time on the streets. They have been involved in both hands on and classroom training, allowed to go on calls as observers. In January they will begin working with crews as part of their orientation process and on the job training while their classroom and hands on experiences continue.

Six of the recruits were able to participate in a live fire training session with Monroe Township Fire Department on October 18th. Firefighters utilized an abandoned house. located on Chain Lakes Rd. in Monroe Township, to practice their firefighting skills. Firefighters rotated through various fire scenarios under watchful instructors. The Hiawatha crew. since they were very new, participated in several scenarios where they were able to observe fire behavior and watch the fire grow. They then extinguished the fire. A total of 12 Hiawatha firefighters participated. Temporary Building Permit and Inspection Policy

The City of Hiawatha has implemented temporary changes to our inspection and permitting processes amid the COVID-19 epidemic as follows until further notice:

Permits:

- Over the counter permits are temporarily suspended until further notice.
- Applications for new permits may be obtained using our online portal at:
 - https://www.citizenserve.com/citizenserve-login/
- Assistance available by phone between the hours of 8am to 4pm, Monday-Friday at (319) 393-1515.

Inspections:

- Construction inspections will be completed as needed and depending on the situation. 24 hour notice required
- New construction and additions: 24 hour notice required. No other change in current operations
- Remodels: inspections within the occupied space will be scheduled or suspended on a case by case basis.
- Furnace and WH replacement installations: Video inspection options are available. Onsite inspections have been suspended until further notice.

Rental inspections:

 Rental inspections are suspended for occupied areas except for emergencies.


Video inspections:

 - Google Messenger



Hiawatha Projects Continue to Move Forward Despite Derecho and COVID-19

The City Council approved a contract with Eastern Iowa Construction from Cascade to install new trails and sidewalks on the western end of Boyson Road as well as within Guthridge Park. In addition, sidewalk ramps along Emmons St were replaced to bring them up to code with the American with Disabilities Act. All work has been completed for each of the sites. Site restoration has been completed but due to the late season, some areas may need to be touched up in the spring. This project wrapped up in October 2020 at a cost of \$220,000.

The City Council approved a contract with Boomerang Corp from Anamosa to install new storm sewer infrastructure on Raney Street and Pirie Street. Work in these two areas started in October and is nearing completion. All that remains is site restoration. Areas will be seeded but minor work will be needed in the Spring. Work should wrap up in November at a cost of \$160,000.

The City Council approved a contract with Peterson Contractors Inc (PCI) from Reinbeck to complete phase I of the Turtle Creek Park. Work included site clearing; mass grading; rock trails; rock parking lot; storm sewer infrastructure and a rock base along Fitzroy for the future roadway. PCI had favorable weather and was able to complete all of the mass grading and seeding for the future soccer fields. If you look closely, you can seed green starting to show up through the straw. All that remains of work on the first phase is installation of decorative fence on the south side of the roadway and minor grading. Some reseeding may be required in the spring. Work should wrap up in November at a cost of \$329,000.

The W. Willman Street resurfacing project from Center Point Road to 4th Ave started the week of July 6. The work included a new asphalt overlay after repair of the deteriorated street areas and replacement of the curbs; and installation of new sidewalk on the north side of the street from the new library expansion to 4th Ave. All work including site restoration has been completed. Work was completed in September at a cost of \$287,000.

The Clark Park trail lighting project began November 9th to install pedestrian and bollard lighting though out the park for safety and walkability in our Hiawatha Community. This project was based off of our 2019 Park Master Plan and is set to be complete December of 2020. The lighting will be active during standard park hours from 6:30am to 10pm. Tucker Park is set to have trail lighting installed Spring of 2021.
