## HIAWATHA POLICE DEPARTMENT ADDS FOUNDATION 2 CO-RESPONDER

The Hiawatha City Council approved a partnership with Foundation 2 Crisis Services for a co-responder program with the Hiawatha Police Department. Foundation 2 Crisis Services has been providing intervention and support services for over 50 years in Linn County and surrounding communities. This 2-year agreement establishes a full-time law enforcement liaison within the police department. The new program funded with dollars received in the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The City Council is committed to supporting this position today and far into the future.

The crisis counselor will collaborate with officers to intervene on mental health-related calls to deescalate situations that may have historically resulted in arrest, provide support to the community, and to assess where individuals in need should be referred for an assessment, treatment, and follow-up services.

The anticipated benefits of the partnership include:

- · A reduction in officer time spent responding to mental health related calls
- Diverting individuals with mental health concerns from jail to behavioral health treatment
- On-site consultation for officers regarding community interactions related to mental health
- Reduction in the officer's use of force by utilizing alternative de-escalation techniques
- · An increase in overall awareness around the importance of differentiating response for individuals with mental health issues
- · Connecting individuals with community resources and mental health care to decrease law enforcement interactions





Jason Miller is our Law Enforcement Liaison for the Hiawatha Police Department. Jason has over 20 years working in the Mental Health field. His experience includes Psychiatric Technician at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Behavioral Specialist at Mercy Medical Center, and 12 years as Case Manager in the PACT program for Abbe Center for Community Mental Health. Within the first few weeks of our new partnership coming online it has already had a positive impact with citizens in our community. We are excited with the initial results and look forward to continuing the benefits of this program to our community.



## WHAT KEEPS THIS GROUP TOGETHER IS A MYSTERY

Hiawatha Public Library has always included lively book discussions as part of its programming lineup. One of its offerings, a mystery book club called While Others Sleep, has endured for years. Hiawatha Public Library launched While Others Sleep in 2006, and though the group has undergone changes, its members are still sharing their love of a good whodunit today.

Retired school teacher and Hiawatha Library patron Donna Schlampp saw the program advertised at its inception and encouraged her friend Cindy Andersen to join her. They both still attend 16 years later, along with 8-10 amateur sleuths each month.

"When we started, we would set up tables and chairs. We soon realized this was too much work, so we abandoned the tables. Since then, we sit in a circle, chairs only, each month," laughed Donna.

Donna and Cindy agree that While Others Sleep's longevity stems from its different approach. Cindy said, "Rather than everyone reading the same book each month, we instead focus on an author. In that way, each individual gets to discuss the title they read. This leads to a lot of crossover discussions from title to title. Additionally, so many mystery authors are known for more than one character or series. Our method encourages group members to try something new."

Early on, Donna assumed a leadership role. She started book club by presenting an author history and providing everyone with one or two questions that should be considered when discussing titles. This worked well but 5 years ago, Donna decided, "I'm too old for this!"

Now, January's gathering is a potluck. Attendees read whatever they prefer. Then, each group member picks a monthly author. It is then that member's responsibility to lead the discussion about the author that they have chosen. This keeps everyone on task and gives each member ownership. This has worked well for everyone. While Others Sleep meets the first Thursday of each month from 2:00-3:00 pm at Hiawatha Public Library. Adults 18+ are invited to join in as the works of Val McDermid are up for healthy debate on April 7.

# FIRE STATION II STEERING COMMITTEE FORMED

Public Safety is the number one priority of the City of Hiawatha. To maintain this priority, it is imperative that the City maintains the best possible Fire Department to protect the lives and property of our citizens and businesses. With the continued growth of the city and increase calls for service within our community, it is important that the city continues to evaluate the facilities and needs of your fire department. This evaluation includes the need for a second fire station. The city has formed a 15-member Fire Station II steering committee made up of Hiawatha Residents, business leaders, elected officials and city staff to aid in this evaluation. These stakeholders will offer guidance and advice to city staff and council members as we navigate evaluating the needs of the fire department and community. The city has used steering committees for several city projects including the construction of City Hall and the remodel/addition to the library. We appreciate the time and commitment these community members are giving to the city and to the fire department as we evaluate the need for a second fire station.

### 2022 NEW BUILDING PROJECTIONS

2022 is also shaping up to be a very good year. One of the developers is anticipating a three-year build out on our most recent residential developments. This will require at least 50 homes to be constructed each year in the Edgewood Road. development area.

Another developer is currently working with the City to rezone and install utilities and improvements for the development of over 150 acres along Edgewood Road. The area includes a variety of possible uses in accordance with the Comprehensive Plan. Uses will include low to high density residential, light commercial and retail along with possible light industrial.

Finally, the City is in the process of rezoning a newly annexed addition at County Home Road and Edgewood Road. The annexation includes approximately 12 acres and the anticipated uses may include commercial and multi-family uses. The area is considered a prime location of one of Hiawatha's neighborhood centers; building on the concepts of healthy neighborhoods with commercial aspects.

### THE IMPORTANCE OF FLUSHING WATER LINES

If the residents of Hiawatha notice the Water crew working at fire hydrants and see water running into the street, you may think that the Department is ignoring its own philosophy on conserving water. The process of periodically "flushing" fire hydrants, however, is an important preventive maintenance activity. Although it may appear to waste water, this process is part of a routine maintenance program necessary to maintain the integrity of the water system and to continue to deliver the highest quality water possible to our customers.

Flushing the water system on a routine basis removes sediment from lines and keeps the entire distribution system refreshed. Hiawatha Water Department maintains over 40 miles of domestic water lines throughout the City.

As a result of the flushing procedure, residents in the immediate vicinity of the work may experience temporary discoloration of their water. This discoloration consists primarily of harmless silt or deposits and does not affect the safety of the water. The water is still drinkable. If you experience discoloration in your water after crews have been flushing in your neighborhood, clear the pipes in your own home by running all water faucets for a minute or two. We also advise to postpone doing your laundry until all internal pipes have been cleared.

This same philosophy of water line preventive maintenance is one that you should use in your own home. Your home's water heater should be drained and flushed at least once a year to keep it working efficiently and to protect the quality of water inside your home. Also, if you go out of town and there is no water use in your home for a week or more, when you return it's always a good idea to run all your faucets for a minute or so before using the water. This ensures that you don't use any stagnant water that may have developed in your home's pipes while you were away.

During this global pandemic, we would like to remind customers who are not regularly occupying their space to flush their water lines. This is to ensure the water does not get stagnate which can create water quality issues such as taste, odor, and loss of bacterial control. By flushing the water lines regularly in an unused facility, the water will continue to maintain its quality.

Starting approximately Monday, March 28, 2022 through Friday May 6, 2022, weather permitting, Hiawatha Water Department will be flushing hydrants.

# FIFTH THE

## AND THE CITIZENS SURVEY SAYS...

Citizens surveys are a kind of opinion poll which typically asks the residents for their perspectives on local issues, such as the quality of life in the community, their level of satisfaction with local government. Surveys are randomly picked and land in citizens' mailboxes throughout the community. We sent out 1.750 of surveys with 163 responses. Citizens respond energetically to surveys that are used as a guide to the development of projects, evaluate programs, and prioritize expenditures. The information taken for the survey acts as our city's benchmark-comparing our community's performance to itself over time, data indicates areas of improvement from our residents perspectives, and provides an open communication tool for residents and city leaders-creating a better understanding of each other. When there is an overwhelming amount of public support for a particular course of action, the city then can take steps to implement that course of action.

The 2021 citizens survey overwhelmingly reflected citizens' wants and desires to continue to invest in our streets, ease of access, outdoor activities, affordable housing, and high-quality jobs.

- Continuously improve and invest in a well-maintained, safe, and effective public infrastructure network and accessible, efficient, adequately regulated city facilities. (18.5%) Primary investment in residential streets (70.5%); Safe and efficient traffic flow (51.3%) and then walking and bicycle paths-connectivity (38.5%)
- High-Quality Community Parks-Playgrounds. (21.2%); Indoor recreation options (18.5%); Outdoor recreation options (15.2%)
- Avoiding negative impact on environment: Water Quality: Protect water resources to maintain water quality of streams and aquifers (17.9%)
- Attraction of Quality Jobs to Hiawatha (27.8%)
- Livable Neighborhoods and Essential Housing (23.2%)
- Attracting Business: Encourage and promote vibrant and secure commercial centers full of thriving businesses and gathering spaces, which support the community's stability. (44.4%)

Although the response rate was lower than expected, the City Council and staff respect the information and our citizens' input as we move forward in our city initiatives to ensure Hiawatha is a great place to live, work and play.

We believe you will see your input reflected in our capital improvement plan, strategic plan goals, current building activity and within our city's budget.

In the following months our Hiawatha Insights staff will reflect on the work being done demonstrating how we are addressing our citizens' input on high priority initiatives.


