Tower Terrace Road Construction – Construction along Tower Terrace Road from Edgewood Road to North Center Point Road is moving along quickly. The on and off ramps northbound are rocked and ready for paving which should occur in the month of June. The old bridge was removed in the first two weeks of June. The intersection of N. Center Point Road and Tower Terrace Road is now officially closed with pavement being removed. Much of the grading for the new roadway west of this intersection has been completed with new storm sewer being installed. The contractor hopes to have new rock and some paving completed by the end of June. There are some new utilities required in the intersection before we will finally be able to start seeing any paving completed possibly during the month of July. The North Center Point Road intersection will likely be closed until mid to late October. On the west side of the interstate, the contractor will likely close Edgewood and Miller Road intersections in early July. Press releases will be issued ahead of the closure. Please keep an eye out for updates on the city website www.Hiawatha-lowa.com

<u>Fitzroy Road Extension</u> – This project expects to extend Fitzroy Road pavement from Forrest Meadow Lane east to the Turtle Creek Park entrance as well as new pavement up to the water tank north of the park. A road closure will be required during the base and pavement operations which may take up to three weeks. As a result, the majority of the work on this roadway will occur after Labor Day weekend to allow for access to the new playground and splashpad.

10th Avenue and Eisenhower Boulevard Improvements – This project entails a full reconstruction of Eisenhower Boulevard from Emmons Street west 200 feet in front of Fire Station I and an asphalt mill & overlay on 10th Avenue from Blairsferry Road north to Emmons Street. This project will include concrete patching, storm sewer upgrades and ADA ramp upgrades. After receiving only one bid that far exceeded the budget, this project is currently being rebid with some new parameters to hopefully reduce the overall costs and receive more bids. This project will now bid on June 28 with council to approve July 6, assuming we can stay under budget. Contractors are very busy and we are hopeful work can begin in late July. We expect to have a few road closures during the milling and asphalt operations along 10th Avenue, as well as a closure on Eisenhower. It is expected that all construction will be completed by the end of November. Residents should expect to see some short detours throughout construction.

MAYOR APPOINTS A VACANT BUILDING ORDINANCE COMMITTEE

The City of Hiawatha is exploring the adoption of a "Vacant Building Ordinance" to address the issue of dilapidated buildings as the City ages. The purpose is to develop a process to facilitate the removal or repair of existing abandoned buildings maintaining a safe and beautiful community.

The proposed Vacant Building ordinance must be enforceable with benefits and attributes not existing in the current ordinances. Initiating a program to eliminate these structures through repair or demolition entails the development and passage of an ordinance in line with the Comprehensive Plan. To provide benefit beyond the existing processes the program should include:

- ·Purpose statement and defined scope.
- ·Specific standards for vacant and abandoned building exterior appearances.
- ·Specific standards for vacant and abandoned buildings for interior safety and sanitation.
- ·Specific demolition requirements for non-compliance within a specified time frame.
- ·Registration fees to recover administrative and inspection costs.
- ·Penalty fees to act as a deterrent to maintaining non-compliant vacant buildings.

A committee consisting of property managers, developers, rental agencies, property owners, realtors, and bankers has been appointed by the Mayor and City Council to study this issue and to make a recommendation regarding the adoption of an ordinance. A draft ordinance has been developed which is a combination of ordinances from Dubuque IA and Brooklyn Center MN. It is more comprehensive than the Cedar Rapids model and addresses the aesthetics associated with abandoned buildings along with a direct reference to demolition orders. The recommended fee is based on the Dubuque model for covering inspection costs.

Implementation of a vacant building ordinance will put the city in a pro-active position rather than a re-active position. This program will provide a policy and plan for reducing the blight caused by abandoned properties and provide a framework for immediately addressing severely damaged property due to a natural disaster such as a derecho. The timely elimination of the abandoned and neglected property will prevent the City from having to address the buildings as nuisances which can be costly in human resources, financial resources and extended time frames to achieve corrections.

The committee is scheduled to meet on Wednesday July 27th to review the available research materials and draft documents. The meeting date, time and location is posted on the City web site and materials are available to the public at this link https://www.towncloud.io/go/hiawatha-ia-cd/agendas/264. The public is welcome to review the material and to attend the meeting which

When the committee has completed their work; the ordinance recommendation will be considered by Council through the ordinance public hearing process. Notice of the public hearing will be published in advance of Council action as specified in State Statutes.








Devon

Natural pyrethrin comes from the chrysanthemum flower, making it safe for our city residents. FIREWORKS AND SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

Public Safety Officials from the City of Hiawatha want to remind you that the display and use of consumer fireworks are allowed in Hiawatha on a very limited basis during the times below. This does not include the display of commercial fireworks. It is important to remember that fireworks may only be used by someone age 18 or older, on their own property, or the property of someone that has consented to use. Do not assume you have permission. Fireworks cannot be used on streets, roads, or other public right-of-ways. That also means the use of fireworks is forbidden in all city parks without a permit. It is your responsibility to know what you are doing and what you are using is legal. The fine for violating any of these laws will be not less than \$250.00. If you cause an injury, fire, or damage to property, you may be charged with additional crimes.

The display of consumer fireworks is allowed only during the following designated times:

- July 4th 12:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m.
- December 31st 6:00 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. on January 1st

<u>Additional safety tips:</u>

- Attend public fireworks displays and leave the lighting to the professionals
- Enjoy outdoor celebrations and cookouts but remember to keep a five foot "safe zone" around grills and campfires
- Build campfires at least 15 feet away from buildings, shrubs or other materials that burn
- Fireworks must only be used with proper adult supervision and never shoot fireworks while intoxicated or impaired. Always expect the firework to do something unexpected.
- When lighting fireworks or having a campfire, keep a garden hose or fire extinguisher nearby in case of problems
- Keep a bucket of water to put wire sparklers in. Sparklers account for nearly 1/4 of all fireworks injuries. Sparklers can burn at 1,200 degrees, can cause 3rd degree burns in a fraction of a second and improperly discarded sparklers can cause fires.
- DO NOT AIM bottle rockets, roman candles and other fireworks toward people, buildings, vehicles or others property.

Keep a distance of 20 feet from buildings and people when lighting fireworks.

Water Commodity Rate Increase

With the recent passing of a resolution to continue the current commodity rate schedule effective July 1, 2022; the Water Department wants to provide our residential customers a few different cost scenarios based on consumption over the first 1000 gallons. These numbers do not reflect irrigation or commercial water usage. And, sewer fees are based on the water charges. Sewer cost is 107% of the water charge.

Minimum Water Rate for the first 1000 gallons for water – No changes will be affecting the minimum water bill. The minimum water bill will continue to be as follows:

Water \$9.08 Sewer \$9.72 Maint. Program \$2.25 Storm Sewer \$4.25 Tax (6% Excise) \$.68 Total Minimum: \$25.98



The following are examples of consumptions over 1000 gallons:

2000 gallons of water used:

Water \$15.52 Sewer \$16.62 Maint. Program \$2.25 Storm Sewer \$4.25 Tax (6% Excise) \$1.07 Total Minimum: \$39.71

6000 gallons of water used: Water \$41.33 Sewer \$44.22 Maint. Program \$2.25 Storm Sewer \$4.25 Tax (6% Excise) \$2.61

Total Minimum: \$94.66

Based on research, an average family of 4 uses about 400 gallons per day. That adds up to 12,000 gallons per month.
