FURNACE MAINTENANCE TIPS

During the winter, your home's furnace is crucial for keeping your family warm and safe. To ensure it operates efficiently and without any risks, follow these essential maintenance tips:

Early Maintenance: To prevent unexpected furnace failures on the coldest nights, be proactive. Conduct furnace maintenance at least once a year, preferably before the heating season starts. Consider a second check in the spring as well.

Visual Inspection: Before performing any work on your furnace, visually inspect it. Ensure the venting pipe and other tubes are securely fastened and properly angled. Also, check for any gas leaks by smelling for the odor of rotten eggs.

Check Thermostat Wires: After turning off the power and removing the furnace doors, gently pull on the thermostat wires to ensure they are tightly connected.

Dust and Vacuum: Dust, dirt, and debris can hinder your furnace's performance. Use a soft tipped paintbrush to gently remove dust and debris from the furnace's inner components. Then, use a portable vacuum to remove the loosened material.

Ongoing Maintenance: Remember to replace the furnace filter regularly. Typically, it should be changed every month, unless the manufacturer provides different instructions.

Consider Professional Help: If you feel uncomfortable or lack the necessary skills to handle furnace maintenance tasks, hire a professional technician. Even if you do some maintenance yourself, having a professional inspect the system can ensure it runs properly and safely.



DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME REMINDERS: CLOCKS, ALARMS AND WATER VALVE MAINTENANCE

On Nov. 5, 2023, clocks will fall back one hour. It's also a good time to check the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms for proper functioning. For water customers, it's advised to exercise the valves near your water meter. These valves help isolate the meter for maintenance or address water leaks on your property. Closing them slowly and reopening them can prevent malfunctioning. The Water Department can help locate your curb stop in emergencies, but afterhours assistance may come with an extra charge. DO YOU HAVE ASH TREES ON YOUR PROPERTY?

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) has taken hold in Hiawatha, inflicting severe damage on ash trees by tunneling beneath the bark. Signs of infestation include cracked bark, branch dieback, and woodpecker-induced "flecking." Flecking starts in the upper canopy and spreads down the tree trunk, signaling the need for prompt removal. Infested trees become brittle and hazardous, necessitating quick removal. Homeowners with ash trees are urged to consult an arborist for inspection. Treatment options exist but require ongoing attention. Soil treatments are discouraged. Diversifying the urban tree canopy helps mitigate pest infestations. Planting less common tree species is advised, as maple trees are overly prevalent and should be avoided due to overpopulation.





RECEIVE SNOW PARKING NOTIFICATIONS THIS WINTER

The City of Hiawatha would like to ensure you know the parking regulations during snow and ice removal operations. Removing vehicles off city streets improves efficiency and safety for street crews and first responders. The City may declare a snow ordinance based on several factors, including snow, sleet, freezing rain and blowing snow. When this snow ordinance goes into effect, the following applies:

- No parking on a city street, alley, or cityowned off-street parking once the snow ordinance is declared.
- Once declared, a snow ordinance is in effect until the snow has stopped falling and City streets are fully cleared.
- When a snow ordinance is in effect, the declaration will be communicated through the following channels:
 - In the Latest News section of the City's website
 - o Text and E-mail alerts
 - Via City of Hiawatha Facebook channels
 - Via local news channels and radio stations

HIAWATHA COUNCILMEMBER HONORED AS 2023 LGBTQ LEGACY LEADER



On September 14, 2023, Hiawatha Councilmember Aime Wichtendahl was one of six lowan's honored as a Des Moines Magazine 2023 LBGTQ Legacy Leader. The fifth annual award honors LGBTQ lowans and allies who have made lowa a better place to call home.

The inspiration for Aime to run for Hiawatha City Council came during a tattoo appointment. The owner of the tattoo parlor told Aime that the city was forcing her business to move. Aime didn't agree with this decision, and thus her first campaign was started pledging to support small business.

In Aime's two terms as a councilmember, she's centered on a variety of everyday issues including property taxes, multifamily housing and new parks. Though she deliberates the big picture, also, including lowa's so-called "brain drain." "A lot of

times, local government is really focused on economic development. But how do you keep people in the state when the state government is doing everything they can to push people out?" she said. "Bigotry disguised as policy can't be allowed to stand."

While accepting the Des Moines Magazine 2023 LBGTQ Legacy Leader recognition, she said "To the great people of the city of Hiawatha, thank you for bestowing your trust on me for these past 8 years. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve you and I can only hope that I've done some small measure to make our community a better place to live, work and play."

Aime became the first transgender lowan elected to public office in 2015 when she was one of five candidates running for only three seats on the Hiawatha City Council. Aime ended up winning with the most votes in that 2015 Council race, it's no surprise that she was reelected in 2019. Congratulations, Aime!




Northwood/Nixon Crosswalk

Northwood/Nixon Crosswalk - This summer, a new sidewalk was installed on the south side of Northwood Drive from Robins Road east to Nixon Drive. Likewise, the City replaced the sidewalk on Nixon Drive, from Northwood Drive up to Nixon Elementary. The new sidewalk crossing at Nixon Drive, provides a safe pathway for all pedestrians, especially with the amount of traffic that travels along Northwood Drive.

A marked crosswalk or pedestrian warning sign can improve safety for pedestrians crossing the road, but at times may not be sufficient for drivers to visibly locate crossing locations and yield to pedestrians. To enhance pedestrian conspicuity and increase driver awareness at uncontrolled, marked crosswalks, Hiawatha installed a pedestrian actuated Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) to accompany the pedestrian warning sign. Research suggests RRFB's can result in motorist yielding rates as high at 98 percent at marked crosswalks. Pedestrians are encouraged to activate the flashing pattern with the pushbutton located on the poles on both sides of the street.

Turtle Creek Park – Hufcutt out of Wisconsin delivered and installed the concrete restroom facility at Turtle Creek Park on September 27th. This 60,000lb structure features two unisex restrooms. Plumbing, water and electrical will be completed over the next couple of months. The facility will remain closed through fall and winter but will open at the start of the 2024 season!



Blairs Ferry and 18th Ave Improvements - The city of Cedar Rapids has been working on the design of roadway improvements at the intersection of Blairs Ferry Road and 18th Avenue for the past couple of years. These improvements include a new road south of Blairs Ferry Road to connect to a private drive at The Fountains. The new roadway is called Accel Drive Avenue. In addition to the new roadway, new traffic signals will be installed, as well as ADA improvements. A new center median will be installed from 18th Avenue west to Edgewood Road. All work should be completed by mid to late November, pending no utility or weather delays.



The State has realigned licensure requirements for residential daycares and as a result cities in our area are adjusting their zoning and home occupancy limits to match the new rules. There are two significant changes; (1) increasing the unlicensed daycare limit from 5 to 6 children, (2) increasing the residential child care allowance to 16 children rather than 11. The purpose of the State increasing these limits is to allow for and encourage more residential child care for which there is presently a shortage in lowa.

The Council has reviewed the new State rules for licensing residential childcare providers. The more significant of the two State changes is allowing up to 16 children as opposed to 11 children for a maximum capacity. The new state rules implement five different levels of licensure with various maximum allowances for capacity. Licensure begins when the daycare has more than 6 children. Various levels of licensure include maximums of 8, 12, and 16 children, depending on services provided, space, and staff qualifications. Our present allowance in Ordinance 165.25 is only up to 11 children; however, the Board of Adjustment (BOA) recently approved a daycare with a limit of 12 children in order to match

Adjustment (BOA) recently approved a daycare with a limit of 12 children in order to match the proposed state licensure allowance. At the BOA meeting, the members expressed interest in adjusting the allowance to 16 children to match the new maximum state licensure for home daycares.

Council has voted in agreement and is adding the State rule reference and language to the amended ordinance. The new ordinance will allow all licensed "Child Development Home" licenses. This will allow up to 16 children in a properly licensed "Child Development Home C (2 providers)". This aligns Ordinance 165.25 with the State rules for licensure and staffing requirements.

The Hiawatha Police Department was awarded the Governor's Traffic Safety Bureau (GTSB) grant, a state-funded initiative aimed at enhancing traffic safety. This grant provides additional compensation to officers for enforcing traffic regulations beyond their regularly scheduled shifts. This approach reduces call-related responsibilities, ensuring that officers can focus on maintaining road safety without compromising their availability for emergencies. Grant requirements are determined based on vehicle crash data, with speeding, seat belt compliance, and impaired driving being the main areas of concern. Particular emphasis is placed on impaired driving enforcement during holidays and special events. Prioritizing impaired driving enforcement during these periods is a crucial step in enhancing the safety of our community.
