The November 7, 2023 General City Election votes have been tallied. Steve Dodson, who joined the City Council in 2018, was elected to serve as Hiawatha's next mayor. Outgoing Mayor Bill Bennett did not run for re-election. He was first elected mayor in 2016. Aime Wichtendahl, who also joined City Council in 2016 retained her position as a City Council member. Two newcomers will join her, Ben Fiedler and Jeff Cater.

SNOW REMOVAL REMINDERS

The City of Hiawatha has snow removal rules in place to help keep our community safe. Here is what you need to know before winter weather strikes:

- Make sure sump pumps and downspouts don't drain to sidewalks. The drainage can freeze causing icy buildup and slippery conditions on driveways, sidewalks, and streets.
- Sidewalks must be cleared within 24 hours after a snowfall event ends. Remember to clear the area around fire hydrants as well.
- When removing snow from your property, do not place it in streets, alleys, driveways, or on sidewalks.
- Commercial Properties Make sure you have a snow removal plan in place this
 winter season. If there is not enough room to store pushed snow on the property,
 you must have a plan for snow removal from the site before snow clearing may
 take place.

Snow Ordinance

Hiawatha's snow ordinance helps ensure safe, effective, and rapid snow removal of our streets. You can help! Do not park in the street when either:

- The National Weather Service predicts three (3) or more inches of snow within 24 hours or
- Three (3) or more inches of snow has fallen and your street has not been cleared Failure to remove vehicles from the public street or City-owned off-street parking will result in a fine of \$25.00 with additional cost resulting from a tow fee.

Note: The City does not conduct normal snow removal operations on all city streets for snowfall of less than two (2) inches.

- Inspect extension cords for damage before use; discard if necessary.
- Prepare live trees by soaking the trunk for 24 hours before bringing them indoors and maintain daily watering.
- Keep trees at least 3 feet away from heat sources.
- Turn off decorations when not in use or when you're not present.
- Place candles 1 foot away from flammable materials, or consider battery-powered alternatives.
- Don't use extension cords with space heaters; maintain a 3-foot clearance from flammable objects.
- Dress warmly and wear layers, including a hat, as 40% of body heat escapes through the head.
- Keep driveways and sidewalks clear of snow and ice, applying ice melt as needed to prevent slips.

These bold thieves prey on unattended packages left on doorsteps, taking advantage of the surge in online shopping. The Hiawatha Police Department is steadfast in its commitment to helping you safeguard your holiday deliveries, ensuring that the season remains merry and theft-free. Here are some tips to safeguard your packages:

- Strategic Scheduling: Opt for delivery times when someone is home to receive the package, or coordinate with neighbors or family to keep an eye out for your deliveries.
- Enhanced Security: Installing visible security cameras, especially around entryways and porches, can act as a deterrent to potential thieves.
- Smart Access Control: Smart lock systems ensure that only you or trusted contacts can access your front door, and they can be controlled remotely via smartphone apps.
- Secure Storage: Where available, utilize package lockers or Amazon Hub lockers to prevent packages from sitting out in the open.
- Stay Informed: Sign up for delivery notifications from shipping companies and online retailers to stay updated on your packages' status.
- Signature Verification: Request a signature for delivery to ensure your package reaches you or an authorized recipient directly.

Closures:


The entry gate will be locked if the ice surface does not allow for safe skating. Check the Hiawatha Parks and Recreation Facebook page for rink status.



September 2021 - Turtle Creek Park playground was installed and open for play.

August 2023 - Two new shade panels were installed offering more shade to our splash pad users.



November 2023 - The Turtle Creek Park Pavilion is nearing completion, which means we will have an additional pavilion that will be available to rent next summer! We will complete the concrete work next spring when weather permits along with laying sod. We anticipate rentals could start in June of 2024!











The Hiawatha City Council has approved ordinance changes which allow certain forms of urban agriculture. It will soon be permissible to keep bees and chickens within the city limits as long as the requirements of Ordinance section 165.28 and Ordinance 55A are met.

Bees will be allowed in Hiawatha as a conditional use. The process includes a hearing before the Planning & Zoning Commission and a public hearing before the Board of Adjustment. The applicant must show compliance to the following:

- Maximum number of hives is two
- Maximum size of the hive is five feet in height and twenty cubic feet in area
- Hive shall be set back five feet from adjacent property lines which do not have a barrier or screening.
- Hives shall not be kept in the front yard or side yard which abuts a street and shall be at least 10 feet from a public sidewalk.
- Hive entrance must face away from adjacent property buildings within twenty feet or shall have a complying "flyway"

Application for a conditional use permit for keeping bees can be made online or at Hiawatha City Hall and the fee for the application is \$150. The process can take up to six weeks to complete.

Chickens will be allowed as a licensure program detailed in City Code Section 55A. Some of the limits and requirements for keeping chickens include the following:

- Chickens are allowed only on property with a single-family dwelling occupied by the permittee.
- Applicant shall notify all adjacent property owners of their plan to keep chickens
- Applicant shall submit a Certificate for attending an approved class on keeping urban chickens.
- No roosters are allowed
- A maximum of six chickens are allowed
- Chicken enclosures are required and shall be twenty-five feet from any neighbor's buildings.
- Chickens shall be secured within a properly fenced yard.
- Chickens shall be secured within a coop each night.
- Chicken yards and coops shall be properly maintained to control odors and predators.

A license to keep chickens will be available at Hiawatha City Hall after January 1st, 2024. The City Council is considering the registration fee and annual fees at their December 6th meeting.

Failure to comply with the ordinance will be considered a nuisance and shall be immediately abated. These rules are in place to promote the good neighbor policies in the City of Hiawatha. For additional information contact the Community Development at 319–393–1515
