HIAWATHA TURNS 75

This summer marks a major milestone for our community — Hiawatha is turning 75! On Saturday, June 14, the City of Hiawatha invites residents and visitors alike to help celebrate our city's history and bright future with a full day of free festivities in the heart of town.

From a spirited parade and live music to family-friendly attractions and a grand fireworks finale, the celebration promises fun for all ages. Guests can enjoy a variety of entertainment, including dance performances, a fire show, games, inflatables, food trucks, and activities for kids like a petting zoo, face painting, and trackless train rides. There will also be a special history display honoring the people and stories that helped shape Hiawatha over the past 75 years.

The story of Hiawatha began with a vision. In 1946, Fay Clark stood looking over farmland and imagined a city. That vision became reality in 1950 when Hiawatha became the 17th incorporated town in Linn County. A businessman, engineer, and spiritual thinker, Clark helped veterans find homes, provided essential services, and served as Hiawatha's mayor for nearly a decade. His legacy lives on in Fay M. Clark Memorial Park and the spirit of innovation and community he fostered.

As longtime resident Bev Daws recalled, "There are probably not enough words in the English language to describe Fay Clark. He believed in helping young people start their lives here in Hiawatha." Former mayor Tom Theis added, "He did not take credit for this city, but I don't know who else the credit would go to."

This year's 75th anniversary celebration is being brought to life by the City of Hiawatha's History Commission and numerous City staff, along with the help of many volunteers and community business partners.

"We're excited to welcome the community for a day that honors our past and celebrates the present," said Mayor Steve Dodson. "It's a chance to gather, have fun, and feel proud of how far we've come."

Whether you're a lifelong resident or a first-time visitor, this is your invitation to be part of something special. Join us on June 14 for Hiawatha's 75th birthday party — a celebration of community, progress, and the enduring power of a great idea.

HIAWATHA'S EARTH DAY & AMNESTY DAY MAKE A BIG IMPACT

Hiawatha residents showed up in a big way for this year's Earth Day and Amnesty Day events proving once again that small actions can lead to big results when a community works together! Thanks to your efforts:

- **9,782 pounds** of electronics were responsibly recycled on Earth Day
- 2,500 pounds of paper were shredded and recycled
- 110 pounds of medication
- 240 pounds of food donated to HACAPP

For years, staff have picked up mattresses during Amnesty Day and delivered them to the Linn County Solid Waste Agency (LCSWA), where they were disposed of with regular refuse at no extra charge. However, with landfill space dwindling—LCSWA estimates only 11 years remain at the



current site—changes have been made to encourage more sustainable disposal. Mattresses pose a particular challenge by taking up a lot of space and don't compress well. To help manage this, LCSWA now charges \$20 per mattress for disposal and tracks each one dropped off at the landfill. In an effort to reduce landfill waste, the Willis Dady Shelter proposed a mattress recycling program. In partnership with LCSWA, they now accept mattresses for \$10 each. To qualify, mattresses must be dry, free of mold and mildew, and not heavily soiled. Shelter residents break down the mattresses and recycle up to 90% of the materials. This year Hiawatha delivered 133 mattresses to Willis Dady during the latest Amnesty pickup—diverting roughly three tons of material from the landfill. Hiawatha residents are encouraged to use this option on their own as well. This simple change is a win-win: it supports sustainability and provides meaningful work for individuals in need.

SAFE DISPOSAL, STRONGER COMMUNITY: HIAWATHA POLICE COLLECT UNUSED MEDICATIONS





On April 26, 2025, the Hiawatha Police Department participated in the City's Earth Day recycling event, focusing on the safe disposal of unused medications. The community turned in a total of 110 lbs of medications, helping prevent misuse and protecting the environment.

In addition to the Earth Day event, the Hiawatha Police Department offers a 24/7 drug drop box. In the past six months alone, 100 lbs of medication have been safely disposed of there. Please note that needles, liquids, and inhalers

cannot be accepted in the drop box; needles should be taken to the Linn County Solid Waste Agency for proper disposal. The department is committed to promoting public health and environmental safety by offering accessible medication disposal options year-round.



SEEDS OF CHANGE: WILDFLOWERS TAKE ROOT AT HIAWATHA'S WATER PLANT

In the fall of 2024, Hiawatha Water Operators Logan Perkins and Robb Dunn embarked on a project to enhance both the appearance and environmental impact of the city's water treatment plant, located at 2910 Fitzroy Road. They envisioned transforming a one-acre section of land on the property by replacing traditional grass with native wildflowers and planting new trees. The area was carefully prepared—existing grass was removed, the soil was conditioned, and a mix of wildflower seeds was sown.

Although it will take a few years for the wildflowers to fully bloom and mature into a vibrant, colorful landscape, the long-term benefits are well worth the wait. This initiative is more than just a beautification effort. By reducing the amount of grass that needs to be mowed, the project will lower maintenance costs and decrease



emissions from mowing equipment. The addition of trees and wildflowers also supports pollinators, improves soil health, and enhances the natural habitat around the facility. Ultimately, the goal is to create a more sustainable and visually appealing environment for both citizens and visitors—especially those enjoying nearby Turtle Creek Park. The project reflects the city's commitment to environmental stewardship and thoughtful land use, and serves as a great example of how small changes can lead to lasting positive impacts.

REMINDER TO TRIM OR REMOVE YOUR DEAD TREES

Although living trees to do have some risk of breaking or falling limbs, dead trees have an increased risk of losing branches and limbs. By looking at the tree canopy in Linn County, it is evident that the emerald ash borer has left a lasting impact on our tree stock. The City of Hiawatha has been diligent to remove dead or dying ash trees from City property to limit the risk of falling branches, but to also make way for additional plantings to help re-establish our canopy. Use this article as a reminder to evaluate the condition of your ash tree(s) to determine what steps may be best for you to minimize hazards, but to also make way for new shade opportunities in your yard.

75 FEET OF FESTIVITY (AND A FEW LESSONS IN WIND!)

In preparation for Hiawatha's 75th Celebration, the Public Works staff has been busy installing yard signs, street pole banners, and two 45' X 3' banners across Center Point Rd. This is the first time we have installed a 45 foot banner and it has been a learning experience! It is made of a mesh fabric. Mesh allows some of the wind to blow through the banner and not be as susceptible to wind damage. However, we have learned that there is not much you can do when you get wind gusts over 40 MPH! We have made a few adjustments to improve the banner durability. Please join us June 14th in Guthridge Park to celebrate Hiawatha!
