### **Council Action**

#### November 4, 2009

Ordinance #653 - Amending the Hiawatha Code of Ordinance by adding Chapter 134 Right-of-Way.

Resolution 09-142 - Pledging financial support for services provided by Entrepreneurial Development Center, Inc. for services in the amount of \$10,000.00 for FY 2010-2011.

Resolution 09-143 - Authorizing staff to sign the Creighton University-Creighton EMS Education and Training - establishing a Field Internship Program for Emergency Medical Technicians-Paramedic Inters and EMT Basic Intern students with the City of Hiawatha beginning November 5, 2009.

Resolution 09-144 - Authorizing the Fire Chief to sign all future education training agreements for the purpose of providing educational training for emergency medical technicians, such as "Ride Along" or Field Internship Programs. Resolution 09-145 - Approving the Shared Road Maintenance and Winter Snow and Ice Control agreement between the City of Hiawatha and Linn County Secondary Road Department to provide for maintenance and upkeep of roads and for Winter snow and Ice control by entering into an agreement for maintenance and upkeep of roads and for Winter snow and ice control on those roads listed.

Resolution 09-146 - Authorizing the Public Works Department to proceed with the purchase of a used pick-up truck for the purpose of spreading de-icing chemicals, hauling water and hydro-seeding and other activities when needed in an amount not to exceed \$10,000,00.

#### November 18, 2009

Resolution 09-151 - Proclaiming November 20, 2009 as Arbor Day in the City of Hiawatha and note that Arbor Day will be floating day in Hiawatha to promote tree planting throughout the year.

Resolution 09-152 - Authorizing the classification of TIF indebtedness as per lowa Code Section 403.19 (5) (a).

Resolution 09-153 - Certification of TIF Funds as per lowa Code Section 403.19 to the County Auditor by December 1, 2009 prior to fiscal year 2011, \$1,707,686 will be certified to the Linn County Auditor for FY 2011 collections.

Resolution 09-154 - Approving the issuance of an "at your own risk" building permit for Midwest Janitorial Services. Resolution 09-155 - Authorizing engineer services to proceed with design plans for the 2009-2010 North Center Point Road Sanitary Sewer Project (North of Tower Terrace Road to the North of City Limits).

Resolution 09-156 - Approving payment for the 2008 Sanitary Sewer Slip Lining Project with the City of Marion, that satisfies the 28E Agreement between the City of Marion and the City of Hiawatha.

# Project Updates

Storm Sewer EPA - We continued labeling storm intakes during the month of September as required by the City NP-DES permit. Visual inspections of the point discharge locations as required by the NPDES permit continued as well. Boyson Road and Robins Road Intersection/Realignment -The lowa DOT had provided comments on the concept statement and on the preliminary design plan set. We are making the changes to address the comments and will resubmit to the lowa DOT when they are complete. We should expect a project agreement within the next two months.

Heritage Green Creek Maintenance - We have completed a wetland determination for this project and submitted the reports to the Corps of Engineers. After discussion with the Corps, we have adjusted the project to a channel widening with flattened slopes to provide for controlling the flow and obtaining detention within the channel. The Corps have reviewed and approved this concept under a general permit. We have sent letters to the adjoining property owners and will begin meeting with them in December as well as conducting another general meeting. 2009 Northwest Sanitary Sewer and Water Main Extension Project - We have continued design on this project with plans and specifications currently at 90%. We are preparing easement documents and will be contacting property owners in December.

2010 North Center Point Road Sanitary Sewer and Water Project - The City Council authorized design work to proceed on this project. Survey work will begin in early December.

### I-Jobs

Legislation was passed during the 2009 session approving I-Jobs, lowa's infrastructure investment initiative. I-Jobs is an \$830 million investment in job creation that will help rebuild a smarter, safe and stronger lowa. I-Jobs is funded by bonds supported by existing gaming revenue. I-Jobs is designed to support "shovel-ready" projects all across the state. The funding will be distributed in two fiscal years. The City of Hiawatha is projected to receive a total of \$62,790. We have received \$28,376.97 in July for our FY10 disbursement. The remaining will be received in July of 2010 for FY11. The funds must be spent within two years. The FY2010 allocation must be expended by June 30, 2011, and the FY 2011 allocation by June 30, 2012.

The I-Jobs funds can be used on engineering and planning services that directly relate to the construction, reconstruction, repair or maintenance of city streets. It can be used for improvements to maintenance facilities if the facility is used exclusively for roadway maintenance purposes.
