


2013 Election Recap

December 2013

HIAWATHA CITY COUNCIL RE-ELECTION

The Hiawatha City Council remains status quo. Martin Bruns and Robert Rampulla were re-elected for their second four year terms. Although the two positions went uncontested, there was a high voter turnout.

Bruns received 647 votes, Rampulla 590 votes and 46 write in votes. Bruns and Rampulla will renew their oaths of office on December 18th at 5:30p.m., during the regular council meeting.



Extension of Local Option Sales & Service Tax Approved

Overwhelmingly, voters of Hiawatha joined the four bordering cities on November 5th to extend the 1% local option sales tax for 10 years. The vote count was a positive 16,950 to 10,310. 62.18% to extend the local option sales & servicetax for an additional 10 years. A quick analysis of November 5th's votes showed Hiawatha, Cedar Rapids, Marion, and Fairfax individually, as cities approved the sales tax by more than a 60% margin, with Robins approving it with about a 55% margin. With an estimation of \$8M in added revenue in the next 10 years means we can move up needed projects, such as streets/right-of-way, facility improvements and water, storm water and sewer infrastructure upgrades and expansions. City staff will begin formulating a LOSST Capital Improvement Plan that will establish priorities and an appropriate timeline for all department projects that were addressed as priorities in our LOSST fliers and the public information meeting that was held on October 28, 2013.

Special Library Levy Voted Down

A special levy to generate additional funds for the Hiawatha Public Library was voted down by 53% of the vote Tuesday, November 5, 2013. The levy proposed a 27 cent per \$1,000 of assessed property valuation with no end date to provide additional revenue to help with operational staffing costs and to defray building expansion costs for the library.

in the Fall of 2016, during a regular city election, held in odd numbered years.





Hiawatha Police and Fire Acquire New Defibrillators

In July, City Council approved the replacement of fire department EKG machines, and the replacement and addition of police department AED's. For the police department, the AED's will replace existing AED's that are over ten (10) years old. In the past, there were not a sufficient number of AED's for every patrol vehicle. This purchase allows each patrol vehicle to carry an AED, assuring the officers have this life saving piece of equipment. The police officers are typically the first one to arrive at a medical call, and earlier this year, two officers utilized an AED to save the life of a Hiawatha man.

For the Fire Department, the purchase allows the FD to replace existing EKG machines that are as old as ten (10) years. The smaller, more technologically advanced EKG machines provide paramedics with additional information regarding patient's status. Upgrades to the communications will allow the EKG's acquired from patients to be efficiently transmitted to hospitals and cardiologists, shaving critical minutes off the time it takes to get a patient with a heart attack the advanced medical care they need.

Hiawatha Citizen Complaint Policy

On October 16, 2013, City Council implemented a Citizen Complaint Policy to establish formal procedures for citizens who wish to file a complaint. The policy also serves as a uniform guide for city staff and elected officials to follow when investigating and processing citizen complaints.

The Citizen Complaint Policy defines the following types of complaints citizens may file with the City:

Infractions Complaint - citizen making a complaint against another citizen for violation of a City ordinance.

Non-Infraction Complaint - citizen making a complaint against the City because they believe a policy or ordinance is unfair. A citizen making a complaint against the City because they believe there has been inaction or inappropriate action taken. Complaints about potholes, street lights out, curb and gutter repairs, and other general requests. Misconduct Complaint - citizen making a complaint against a City employee or elected official.

The policy provides proper procedures for citizens to follow in order to file each type of complaint with the City and details how the investigation and resolution process will be handled once the complaint is received and reviewed by City staff or elected officials. If a citizen wishes to make a misconduct complaint against a City employee or elected official, the Citizen Complaint Policy instructs the citizen to fill out a Citizen Complaint Form and return it to the City Administrator or the Mayor if it involves the City Administrator. In order to protect employees, elected officials and citizens, it is important that any misconduct allegations be investigated by City management first to ensure they are based on factual information, before the allegations are made in a public setting such as a council meeting when it is not warranted or appropriate.

Snow Ordinance Reminder

Our Snow Ordinance will be in effect when the National Weather Service (NWS) predicts a snowfall in which three (3) or more inches are expected. While the Snow Emergency is in effect, there is no parking on any city street. Vehicles found parked in violation of this ordinance will receive a \$25 parking ticket and/or be impounded. During overnight snow removal operations, vehicles found in violation on City streets will be towed.

The Snow Emergency declaration will be given to all the local media including but not limited to: KGAN (Channel 2), KCRG (Channel 9), and KWWL (Channel 7). The declaration will also be posted on the City website, www.hiawatha-iowa.com. Your cooperation is appreciated.

REMEMBER - Don't park in the street if:



The 24 hour (or less) prediction by the NWS is for three (3) or more inches of snow. Three (3) or more inches of snow has fallen and/or your street has not been cleared.

Also, the City will NOT generally conduct snowfall clearing operations for a snowfall of less than two (2) inches. This policy remains unchanged from prior years. Please remember: Sidewalks must be shoveled with 24 hours of the cessation of snow fall, clear snow from around fire hydrants that are near your property, check with your neighbors regarding snow removal and direct sump pumps and downspouts away from hard surfaces so that water doesn't build up and freeze, creating slippery conditions on driveways, sidewalks, or streets.
