TURTLE CREEK PARK

Turtle Creek Park will soon be a place to play and create! The City purchased the northwest Hiawatha property in 2018 and completed a Park Master Plan in 2019 to help guide the development. In 2020 the City broke ground and completed Phase 1 of development in November of 2020. The City is now in Phase 2 development of Turtle Creek Park with an expected completion spring of 2022.

Phase I included:

- Excavation and rock base of the extension of Fitzrov
- 10 foot rock surfaced trail from Edgewood Road down Fitzroy Road to the new park entrance
- Installation of storm culvert under Fitzroy Road
- 10 foot rock surfaced trails
- · Grading and site restoration of two soccer fields.

Phase II includes:

- Paving of 10' gravel trails
- Paving of Fitroy Road trail
- Construction of a new parking lot
- Construction of a new playground and splashpad
- Construction of stormwater detention basin. This has the possibility of being used as a future ice skating rink in the winter
- Installation of water main for a future well and

What does the future have in store? Possibilities

- A restroom building at the north playground area
- New recreation building near the south end of the site with playground and parking lot
- Extension of trails to connect to new subdivisions to the west and south



Restrooms at all Hiawatha Parks have been winterized and closed for the winter season. Temporary restrooms have been placed at Clark, Tucker, Turtle Creek and Guthridge Parks for your convenience.

Tree plantings have been ongoing this fall in four (4) parks throughout the city and in all right-of-ways thanks to funding through Trees Forever and Mid-American's Branching Out grant. We continue to partner with Trees Forever, local businesses and other agencies for funding opportunities to add additional trees in parks and right-of-ways. The Public Works and Parks Department are conducting annual pruning while overseeing stump removal and addressing residents' concerns. Planning for spring plantings has begun and there is continuous progress on long-term planting goals. Spring planting opportunities will be announced in March of 2022.

TREE PLANTING TIP:

Prepare young trees for winter. Give your tree 2-3 inches of mulch all the way out to the tips of the branches; making sure the mulch does not touch the trunk. Add a tree quard to the trunk to protect against rabbits eating the bark. Continue watering until the ground freezes, then remove your watering bag until springtime watering begins.

Another Good Neighbor Policy

We are now entering the snow and ice season for northeast lowa. Last year brought us more than an average amount of snow and it became difficult for all of us to keep our sidewalks clear. As a reminder, our city believes in maintaining a safe environment for our residents and visitors through a good neighbor policy of sidewalk maintenance.

According to Ordinance 136 of the Hiawatha code the property owner is responsible for clearing the sidewalk adjacent to their property within 24 hours of the cessation of a snow or storm event. Further; according to the ordinance, the City may take immediate action 24 hours after a snow event to remove the snow and ice and to assess the cost to the property owner without notice. The ordinance also states the adjacent property owner may be held liable for damages due to lack of maintenance. Check with your neighbors regarding snow removal and direct sump pumps and downspouts away from hard surfaces so that water doesn't build up and freeze, creating slippery conditions on driveways, sidewalks or streets.

136.03 REMOVAL OF SNOW, ICE, AND ACCUMULATIONS

The abutting property owner shall remove snow, ice, and accumulations promptly from sidewalks. If a property owner does not remove snow, ice, or accumulations within a reasonable time, not to exceed 24 hours following the cessation of snow fall or the forming of ice, the City may do so and assess the costs against the property owner for collection in the same manner as a property tax. The abutting property owner may be liable for damages caused by failure to remove snow, ice, and accumulations promptly from the sidewalk.

In Hiawatha, the process reflects an enforcement policy which reminds the citizenry we can accomplish this goal together as neighbors in a timely manner to maintain public safety. The process remains as implemented in

- The city receives a complaint and opens a "snow complaint" file for the
- · The city performs an inspection to verify snow has accumulated on the sidewalk
- The city contacts the owner through door notice and a one-time letter notice. The reminder at your door and the letter are your invitation to correct the safety hazard as quickly as possible. If the sidewalk is cleared, no further action is required.
- The city re-inspects the sidewalk and if necessary, has the sidewalk cleared of snow.
- The city sends the bill for snow removal and penalties to the responsible property owner

For all subsequent snow complaints on a given property:

- √The city will verify snow has accumulated on the sidewalk and,
- **√**Without further notice, the city may schedule the snow to be removed and.
- \checkmark The city will send the bill for snow removal and penalties to the responsible property owner.

- Check your water heater and/or softening units manufacturing recommendations for a "vacation
- Wrap water lines in heat tape and add insulation around skirting to avoid drafts in mobile homes
- Contact the Hiawatha Police Department to request that officers keep an extra eye on your home while you are away.


