FROM THE MAYORS DESK - A Review of 2018



Recently, City Administrator Kim Downs and I, looked back over the past year to assess our accomplishments, projects completed and next steps. By all accounts 2018 has been a remarkable year. We have seen more blessing than I can count but I will attempt to share with you our accomplishments.

In this space we have learned that success is never easy. It requires diligence and the ability to overcome hurdles. And, as we have seen, there are always hurdles that bring knowledge and then success. It's true in life and it's true in city government.

The following list is presented to you with pride and a sense of satisfaction.

Infrastructure Improvements

- Finalizing out Emmons Street/Robins Road/North Center Point Road Reconstruction Project
- Completed the reconstruction of North Edgewood Road
- Completed reconstruction of Emmons Street from 9th-10th Avenue and then from North Center Point Road to railroad tracks
- Completed the Robins Road overlay from Bali Hi to Stonegate Court
- Received Iowa Department of Transportation confirmation of the construction of the Tower Terrace Interchange beginning construction in Fiscal Year 2022
- Continue-sanitary sewer televising/slip lining inspection program

Beautification

- Established an ash tree removal and tree trimming program
- Final streetscape project along the Emmons Street/ Robins Road/North Center Point Road
- Secured our first Housing Rehabilitation Program; six homes will be rehabbed. Construction to begin in February.

Public Safety

- Began the Fire/Ambulance Master Plan Study
- Implemented an improved inspections and preplanning building of commercial/light industrial facilities
- Entered into contracts with both area hospitals providing community paramedicine in-home care plan services

Recreational/Educational Amenities

- Purchased property along North Edgewood Road for future park expansion
- Raised over \$2M for and began developing specifications for construction of the library remodel and expansion project to bid in March
- Signed agreement with Linn County to develop our first dog park; Dave Wright Nissan Subaru donated \$100,000 for development of park
- Added 10 acres of park land to Tucker Park donated by Hodge Construction
- Successful 3- Year Fun Fest Event



Rest assured the Water Department employees work diligently to find the source of the leak and correct the issue to reestablish water to your property in a timely manner. We appreciate your patience when a situation like this arises.

Iowa DOT Schedules Public Hearing January 22, 2019

The Iowa Department of Transportation (IDOT) will hold a public hearing Tuesday, January 22, to discuss the proposed improvements to I-380 between Collins Road/Iowa 100 and County Home Road, which includes 6-laning I-380, rebuilding the Boyson Road interchange and adding an interchange at Tower Terrace Road. The completed environmental assessment will also be available.

The public hearing will be conducted using a combined open forum and formal format. During the open forum, from 5 to 5:45 p.m., IDOT staff will be present to informally discuss the project. After the open forum, a formal presentation will be displayed beginning at 5:45 p.m. and followed by a question-and-answer session.

Persons wishing to make a formal statement or ask questions will need to note that at the time of registration. There will be a three-minute limit per speaker during the question-and-answer session. Hiawatha Approves Design Contract for New Traffic Signal at Center Point Road and Willman Street


