The City of Hiawatha celebrated Earth Day on April 21, 2013. It is important we celebrate Earth Day to create more awareness in our community and show we care for the earth. This day people take extra good care of the earth by bringing their personal papers for shredding or dropping off their household chemicals instead of throwing them away in their regular garbage pickup.

Over 260 residents participated in this event, this number is up from 2012 with 245.

Our community saved 25.76 trees by shredding paper, collected 1399 lbs of household hazardous waste, 14,828 lbs of electronic equipment, 2-33 lb bags of unserviceable flags, several pairs of eyeglasses, hearing aids and prescription waste. Mowing Season is Here!

Spring weather has finally arrived, everyone has been busy chasing their lawn mowers to keep up with the always growing grass in their yards.

PLEASE remember to direct the grass clippings back onto the yard where it can decompose and create additional natural fertilizer for the yard. When the clippings are blown into the street, they make their way into the City's storm system, clogging and creating issues for fish and natural wildlife which is part of the metro storm sewer system.

PLEASE remember that a large part of Hiawatha drains into the McLeod natural runoff area. Grass clippings are considered to be an illicit discharge to the City's storm sewer system and could result in actions by the City to recover costs associated with the clean-up of the illicit discharges.

History Committee - I-380 to Urbana

On August 15, 1984, Hiawatha officials and the Iowa Department of Transportation joined a crowd of about 150 for a ribbon cutting ceremony beneath the Boyson Road overpass on I-380 to celebrate the opening of the 18.1 mile section of Interstate 380 between Boyson Road and Urbana.

A caravan of vintage cars took officials north of Urbana, and a line of about 50 cars and trucks followed. Ken Block of Cedar Rapids drove one of the several vintage cars carrying the dignitaries north of Urbana. Bill Albaugh, owner of Bill's Towing Service of Hiawatha and participant was excited about the opportunities the Interstate was going to bring, "I think the Interstate's going to be exceptional for businesses, especially in the winter". Albaugh said "People aren't going to be used to it, and they're going to barrel into the slippery spots and slide right off". If Bill was in business today, he would still be excited about the opportunity to help someone off the road.

I-380, its interstate system stimulated commercial/residential growth that takes place along the corridor of the interstate highway system that allows suburban areas to flourish, which is evident in Hiawatha today!

Also, please be considerate of your neighbors if you own a dog. Do not let your dog(s) run at large. Each owner is responsible to ensure their dog(s) do not bark or howl excessively causing neighbors to be unduly disturbed.

Police Department Firework Safety

It is that time of year when fireworks become popular for a few weeks surrounding the 4th of July. Here are a few important safety reminders from the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

- Never point or throw fireworks at another person.
- Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap.
- After fireworks fully complete their functioning, douse the spent device with plenty of water from a bucket or hose before discarding to prevent a trash fire.

Adults should always supervise fireworks activities. Parents often don't realize that there are many injuries from sparklers to children under five. Sparklers burn at temperatures of about 2,000 degrees - hot enough to melt some metals. Your safety is important to us, by following these simple guidelines, you can ensure your safety and the safety of others.
