





The results of the 2020 Census will help determine how hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funding flows into communities every year for the next decade. That funding shapes many dif-

ferent aspects of every community, no matter the size, no matter the location.

The Importance of Flushing Water Lines

If the residents of Hiawatha notice the Water crew working at fire hydrants and see water running into the street, you may think that the department is ignoring its own philosophy on conserving water. The process of periodically "flushing" fire



hydrants, however, is an important preventive maintenance activity. Although it may appear to waste water, this process is part of a routine maintenance program necessary to maintain the integrity of the water system and to continue to deliver the highest quality water possible to our customers.

Flushing the water system on a routine basis removes sediment from lines and keeps the entire distribution system refreshed. Hiawatha Water Department maintains over 40 miles of domestic water lines throughout the City. As a result of the flushing procedure, residents in the immediate vicinity of the work may experience temporary discoloration of their water. This discoloration consists primarily of harmless silt or deposits and does not affect the safety of the water. The water is still drinkable. If you experience discoloration in your water after crews have been flushing in your neighborhood, clear the pipes in your own home by running all water faucets for a minute or two.

We also advise to postpone doing your laundry until all internal pipes have been cleared. This same philosophy of water line preventive maintenance is one that you should use in your own home. Your home's water heater should be drained and flushed at least once a year to keep it working efficiently and to protect the quality of water inside your home. Also, if you go out of town and there is no water use in your home for a week or more, when you return it's always a good idea to run all your faucets for a minute or so before using the water. This ensures that you don't use any stagnant water that may have developed in your home's pipes while you were away.

Beginning approximately Monday, March 23, 2020, through Friday April 30, 2020, weather permitting, the Hiawatha Water Department will be flushing hydrants.

Council and Planning and Zoning Implement Robins Road Corridor Study

With the guidance and assistance from Bolton and Menk's professional planner; Rose Schroder, and input from the implementation work group, City staff completed documents which implement the land use recommendations from the Robins Road Corridor Study. The intent is to control and accommodate land development which



reflects the vision of the Comprehensive Plan 2036 as detailed in the study.

To accomplish that goal, Council has approved an ordinance establishing an overlay district in our Unified Development Code (UDC) by amending the text of the UDC. Mixed Use Overlay District. The Mixed-Use Overlay District is intended to ensure consistent site development of properties located in and near the Neighborhood Village Centers. The standards will aid to unify the appearance, encourage a pedestrian friendly built environment, ensure the beautification and function of the centers of commerce located in and near residential uses.

Along with the new overlay, rezoning has been approved for portions of the underlying zoning districts. The nature of the mixed-use overlay requires:

- Elimination of industrial uses which are not compatible with residential and retail uses.
- Elimination of residential single-family dwellings along the "main street" in order to accommodate neighborhood businesses.
- Creation of transitions from business uses to residential uses.
- Creation of high-density residential uses in the vicinity to support the central
- business commerce and
- Revitalization of the area as part of vibrant "Downtown" Hiawatha through public improvements on Robins Road.

The timeline for development in the area is unpredictable. Ms. Schroder stated, "In my experience, since this redevelopment is privately driven no time table for specific projects is available and the redevelopment in this situation varies greatly, from five years to more than 25 years depending on circumstances." It is anticipated the reconstruction of Robins Road coupled with the development of a "downtown" at the south end of this district will act as catalysts for redevelopment and shorten the 25-year projection.

We look forward to the continued development and in this case re-development as it progresses along Robins Road and throughout Hiawatha. The Vision encapsulated in the new overlay reflects the values for developing and maintaining a growing, welcoming and friendly beautiful Hiawatha.

Library Renovation and Expansion Project Updates

Seasonal weather conditions will continue to impact this schedule. Exterior backfill has been placed. The bar joists and decking for the main level have been installed, as well as the interior steel stairs.

The main level concrete floor slab is complete and the upper level masonry elevator slab and wall has been constructed. Interior wall framing is ongoing, wall sheathing has been installed, with roof trusses set, shingling will follow. The HVAC and electrical rough-ins have begun in the lower level.

Phase I-completion date is now May 13, 2020, with the Phase II completion date is now set for August 14, 2020.
