Fire and Water Dept work to improve fire insurance rating for the city.

The City of Hiawatha recently had a change in it's insurance rating from the Insurance Services Office (ISO). Hiawatha improved from a Class 5 to a Class 4 rating of it's fire department and it's ability to handle fires. In October of 2008, a representative from ISO visited Hiawatha. They evaluated both the Fire Department and the Water System. Both departments have made considerable investments, and they have paid off. ISO ratings are used to determine insurance rates for both residential and commercial occupancies.



ISO ratings are based on a scale of 1-10, where 1 is the best, and 10 is essentially no fire protection. There are separate ratings for areas with hydrants and without hydrants. In Hiawatha, our rating is a 4, and in the rural areas of Monroe Township that HFD protects, it is an 8. Out of 2300 rated communities in lowa, there are no class 1 or class 2 departments, 27 class three (Usually paid departments such as Cedar Rapids) and 37 class 4, that puts Hiawatha in the top 3%!

In the case of the water department, improvements in the water distribution system resulted in a strong gain in points. For the fire department, the addition of a ladder truck and an additional fire engine with added pumping capability also provided strong gains. Another key area for the fire department was improvements in our fire training. We are utilizing a state sponsored regional fire training facility in Coralville. ISO gave us credit for that facility. While the addition of the ambulances did not change anything, the addition of the paid staff that accompanied that also added points.

In a growing community like Hiawatha, continual improvements are important to maintain our rating. If your fire department had the same amount of people and equipment today as it did at the last evaluation in 1986, your insurance rates would have gone up. We appreciate the support that you continue to show to the fire department.

Recreational Fire Rules

It's that time of year again, when people like to have small "camp fires" and enjoy the outdoors. Referred to as recreational fires, they are generally the only fires that are allowed in the metro area. Prairie burns and Fire Department training fires are allowed, but only under special circumstances. The burning of trash, leaves, etc. is strictly forbidden. The Fire Department wants to remind everyone of the following rules:

Burn only clean and dry wood! <u>Do not burn any of the following materials</u>: Leaves, grass, plant remnants, brush, tires, oil, garbage, rubber, plastic, or aerosol cans. Remember that treated or contaminated woods may contain arsenic and/or cyanide. When burned they produce toxic gases. These gases can harm you, your children, and your pets.

Fire must be at least 25 feet from any structure, fire can be within 15 feet of structure if unit has complete protection (screen and (lid).

Total fuel area must be 3 feet or less in diameter and cannot exceed 2 feet height.

Fire must be attended until extinguished by the attendant and the attendant must have a means of extinguishment near the fire.

Winds exceed 15 mph

Do not burn when:

A city, county, or state-wide burn ban is in place

You are not able to comply with the regulations

You have been directed by the Fire Department or another agency to stop burning

The smoke from your fire is creating a nuisance to others.



Remember, if the Fire Department determines that hazardous or potentially hazardous conditions exist. Or if a fire is a nuisance, we can require extinguishment even if the fire meets all of the conditions listed. You can also receive a citation resulting in a fine for violating the clean air ordinances established by the county.

Every year we receive a handful of 9-1-1 calls about fires that turn out to be recreational fires. Many of them are "mistaken identity fires". Someone sees a glow and truly believes there is a fire. However, some are simply neighbor disputes. Remember, when you activate the fire department for a call that isn't an emergency, you take volunteer firefighters away from their families and personal time, and put everyone at risk. In fact you may be taking them away from a real emergency. If you intentionally and deceptively call 9-1-1 to report a fire you know is a recreational fire, you are breaking the law.

It's nice to enjoy a good, clean recreational fire on these cool spring evenings. Please stay within these guidelines and work with your neighbors to make sure everyone can enjoy the weather.

American Legion Post 735 Blue/Gold Star Banners



The Blue Star Service Banner was designed and patented in 1917 by World War I Army Capt. Robert L. Queissner of the 5th Ohio Infantry who had two sons serving on the front line. It quickly became the unofficial symbol of a child in the service.

The Blue Star Service Banner typically displayed in windows is an 8.5 by 14 –inch white field with a blue star(s) sewn onto a red banner. The size may vary but should be in proportion to the size of the U.S. Flag.

Today Blue Star Service Banners are displayed by families who have a loved one serving in the armed forces including the National Guard and Reserves of all military departments. The banner displayed in the front window of a home shows a family's pride in their loved one serving in the military, and reminds others that preserving America's freedom demands much.

The blue star represents one family member serving in the armed forces. A banner can have up to five stars, signifying that five members of that family are currently in military uniform on active duty.

If the individual symbolized is killed or dies while service, the star representing that individual will have superimposed on it a gold star of smaller size so that the blue forms a border. On flags displaying multiple stars, including gold stars, when the flags are suspended as against a wall, the gold star(s) will be to the right of, or above the blue star(s), a place of honor nearest the staff.

Blue Star Mothers and Gold Star Mothers organizations were established during World War I and remain active today.

Blue Star Service Banners, while widely used across America during World Wars I and II, were not embraced during the Korean or Vietnam wars with nearly the same enthusiasm. The American Legion is rekindling the spirit of pride in our military men and women following the horrific terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. The American Legion is providing banners to families in communities across the nation. Static cling versions for home and automobile, as well as lapel pins, are available from The American Legion National Emblem Sales at www.emblem.legion.org.

The American legion also has a special Blue Star Banner Corporate Flag for government and corporate America to show their support for employees called to active duty.
