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Metro Economic Alliance Innovation Council Tours Hiawatha Businesses

On September 13, 2012, the Cedar Rapids Metro Economic Alliance Innovation Council toured Ahmann Design/Compass Commercial Services/Fusion Architects Inc., all located at 1641 Boyson Square Drive and the future Kirkwood Community College Regional Center at 1779 Boyson Road, Hiawatha.

Joe Ahmann of Ahmann Design graciously gave a tour of his building, which encompasses Ahmann Design, Compass Commercial Services and Fusion Architects, together they provide a vast majority of services that focus on providing custom home design services and comprehensive planning and architectural design services for a variety of community sectors. They have resources to handle multiple projects regardless of scope or type, with experience in design ranging from commercial office to multi-family apartment complexes. Plan development and design, site planning, consultation, architecture, sustainable design, site evaluation, space planning, historic preservation, program analysis that defines the functional and operational requirements of designed spaces.

Mindy Thorton, Director of Linn County Regional Center and Amber Aiken, Center Assistant provided a tour that explains the layout of the future regional center in Hiawatha, Iowa. Kirkwood Community College is anticipating to open the regional learning center in August of 2013. With today's global economy, we are forced into significant changes in how secondary and post-secondary institutions deliver education. Nearly 70% of all jobs will require some form of training beyond high school. Kirkwood, K12, and Industry Partners are aligning to yield a viable, educated workforce to sustain the competitive advantage and quality of life in our region. With global vision and innovative curriculum, Kirkwood is redefining the role of the community college in meeting the academic needs of the 21st century. Now more than ever, that vision is reaching far beyond its growing main campus in Cedar Rapids. The Northern Kirkwood Region will offer traditional college programming as well as innovative, high tech career academies with industry recognized certifications, Liberal Arts and Science transform courses, Occupational Therapy Assistant (primary location for Kirkwood's degree program), Physical Therapy Assistant (primary location for Kirkwood's degree program), writing lab, Development Math Emporium, test center, tutor center, Financial Aid Services, Academic Advising, and Career Counseling Services.

In partnership with K12 schools, the facility will offer morning and afternoon blocks of Career Academy programming for approximately 250 high school aged students. Additionally Thorton states, "The center will offer traditional and non-traditional student programming between 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, as well as some weekend offerings." They anticipate approximately 600+ students enrolling in college credit programming during year one at the Hiawatha location. Additionally, non-credit and continuing education certifications will be available. Kirkwood Community College is thrilled to collaborate with the City of Hiawatha, as well as our partnering districts, and surrounding communities, to move opportunities for student successes and economic development forward in our region.

Dave Saari and Arlo Waterhouse were there from the start, the current chairman of the event is Larry Shepard with Craig Clark responsible for the advertising and public relations. Mr. Hog Wild Days or "Head Piggy" was Lee Waddington, who played a significant role in the success of Hog Wild Days.

Over the years, a 5K run and fireworks were added and the light show is amazing!

Charter members of the Lions Club of Hiawatha years ago consisted of 35 to 40 members, today there are approximately 17 guys and gals that are truly hard working dedicated volunteers to make it all work. 90% of the money raised goes back into the community. HACAP and Homeless Children's Trust Holiday Assistance

In November of 2011, the Hawkeye Area Community Action Program's (HACAP) Homeless Children's Trust discovered a larger than ever need of holiday assistance for the area's homeless children. 40th Anniversary of the Clean Water Act

On Saturday, October 20, 2012, the Cities of Cedar Rapids, Marion and Hiawatha celebrated the 40th Anniversary of the Clean Water Act at Noelridge Park.

The world saw first-hand the damages that pollutants cause in our waterways and there were great concerns for the citizens of the U.S. and their livelihoods.

President Nixon enacted the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendment of 1972 - the modern clean water act - establishing a national commitment to restore and maintain the chemical, physical and biological integrity of the nation's waters. The Clean Water Act has been instrumental in providing the health of rivers, lakes and coastal waters. It has stopped billions of pounds of pollutants from fouling the water, dramatically increasing the number of waterways that are safe for swimming and fishing. (www.pbs.org Now 2012) In 1969, pollution in Chesapeake Bay caused \$3M annually in losses to the fishing industry. The Hudson River was 170 times over the safe limit of bacteria. 46 million fish were killed in Lake Thonotossa, Florida, due to discharges from four (4) food processing plants and in the Cuyahoga River, just southeast of Cleveland Ohio, a floating oil slick burst into flames, causing significant fire damage to two key railroad trestles. The Cities of Hiawatha, Cedar Rapids, and Marion take our responsibility of keeping our waterways safe and out of harms way by providing a storm water distribution policy and setting guidelines for developers. The City of Hiawatha has taken these guidelines very seriously and have led by example. The City has created their own bio-swale in front of City Hall, along with porous concrete parking lots and a detention basin. GSB at Guthridge and Tucker Park

Hiawatha City Council allocated Local Option Sales and Service Tax funds this year for Gilsonite Sealer Binder (GSB) Preservation of Tucker and Guthridge Parks. The scope of the project included crack sealing, GSB, and striping for Tucker Park parking lot with trail and Guthridge Park parking lot 10th Ave., N. 7th and 8th Ave., and the trail. The project was done by Gee Asphalt Systems for \$30,099. Our goal is to preserve our parking lots and trails and extend the life of our infrastructure. By preserving the pavement with GSB, we reduce our future cost in repairs and the need for reconstruction. GSB products are a reinvestment in asphalt which should be done every five years for parking lots and eight years for trails. Our plan is to do the same treatment for Fay M. Clark Park in an upcoming Capital Improvement Plan project.

Relocation of Wellhouse #5



With the City's growth north and west along Loggerhead Road, the Water Department has acquired 3.7 acres of land along Hay Lane for a municipal well and water storage reservoir

The Water Department is in the planning and design stages for this well, which will replace our existing Well #5.

Well site #5 is located at the corner of North Center Point Road and Boyson Road. This property has recently been demolished and sold for redevelopment in the area.



Hiawatha Projects Update

Active construction projects

The City of Hiawatha is wrapping up its construction projects for the year. North Center Point Road from Stamy Road to Tower Terrace Road is nearly complete after receiving the final grading and seeding in early October. Acceptance of the project will not occur until next spring to make sure the grass is established and no surprises occur over the winter months such as additional ground settling.

The only other project currently under construction is the Clymer Road Storm Sewer Extension which includes installing 390 feet of storm sewer and 300 feet sub drain along Clymer Road east of Thiher Drive. This project is expected to be complete by November 1, 2012 with seeding to follow in the spring of 2013.

Upcoming construction projects

The City has two major projects currently under design for construction starting next year. Boyson Road and Robins Road will see a complete reconstruction with the addition of turn lanes and traffic signals, which will help relieve the current congestion. The estimated cost is \$750,000 and is partially funded by a Surface Transportation Program (STP) grant. The project is scheduled to be bid in January 2013 and construction will begin in March 2013.

The other project currently under design is the reconstruction of North Center Point Road from the Canadian National Railroad to Fisher Street. This project will extend the four lane section ending just north of the railroad tracks to connect with the existing four lanes at Fisher Street. It will include railroad crossing gates, decorative lighting, under grounding of the utilities and landscaping. The estimated cost is nearly \$3M and is partially funded with a State RISE grant of \$576,944. The project is scheduled to be bid in January 2013 with construction beginning in March 2013.
